GLORIA MILLER ALLEN WORKSHOP ~ Suggested Supply List

For those who are seasoned watercolor painters with their own palette and paper preferences, I list these supplies only as a reference. For those who are relatively inexperienced, or artists who normally use other media, I list the following as a place to start. As your experience deepens, you will find your own preferred palette, brushes etc. Therefore, this is not intended as a list of supplies you MUST bring with you. If you are an oil painter, or other, buy just a few of these paints and paper etc. However, I do ask that EVERYONE bring a 3-ring Binder for their notes and handouts. You will have a book by the end of the workshop.

Paints: Suggested brands; Winsor Newton, Grumbacher, Holbein, Daniel Smith, and Graham are reliable paints. They are saturated with color and are good choices. If you already have paints, bring them.

**It will be necessary to have at *least one* blue, one red, and one yellow, and on the day we concentrate on values, it would be nice to have Payne's Gray, Burnt Umber or a dark Sepia. Of course more colors are great, but if you are looking for a list of colors to buy, start with the ones marked with an asterisk*. Otherwise, bring what you normally use.

Colors:

Blues: Ultramarine, Cerulean, *Cobalt, Prussian Blue, Antwerp Blue Yellows: Gamboge, Cadmium Yellow, *Raw Sienna, Lemon Yellow,

Reds: Winsor Red (Winsor Newton) *Permanent Alizarin, Permanent Rose

Earth tones: *Burnt Sienna, Yellow Ochre,

Neutrals: *Payne's Gray, Neutral Tint, Davies Gray

Just for fun and expanding your palette: Opera (Holbein), Rose Madder, Yellow Ochre, Winsor Green., Turquoise, Prussian blue and green, Cadmium Orange, Hookers Green, Violet, Cadmium Orange, etc. . You might enjoy trying some

Quinacridone colors. They are brilliant, intense and fun. These extras are purely your choice.

Brushes: 2-3 rounds small, medium, large (should come to a good point when wet)

2-3 flats or oval washes (should make a fine chiseled edge when wet)

Palette: should be white, have wells for the colors and have a lid. There are many good ones to choose from: Mine is a Robert E. Wood Palette

Watercolor Paper: suggested brands:

Winsor Newton,* D'Arches, Lanaquarelle, Fabrianno, Saunders, or any other rag.

** You will need at least 1 sheet of 90 lb. and 1-2 sheets of 140 or 300 lb. paper.

Before class please cut the 90 lb. paper into 8 ½ x 11 inch sheets.

These can be used for academic studies and can be paper-punched to fit into your notebooks.

Small Drawing Board: (¼ sheet size or larger) wood, plexi-glass, plastic, heavy cardboard etc.

Other supplies: Water bucket, paper towels, tape, scissors, pencil, paper, black Sharpie Pen, bull-dog clips, sponge, and sketches or snapshots to work from. If you have tracing paper, graphite paper, bring it., but I will have some too. In other words just BRING YOUR STUFF. ©

Please DO bring one disaster painting. We will talk about how to resolve paintings, and I will use one or two of your disaster paintings to show what can be done. Throw in some notebook paper, at least one sheet of *tracing paper, and a little sketch paper (cut to 8 ½ x 11 for your binder). As I said before, we will be making a book, our own study/text book from class.

Be sure to bring your questions, paintings you want help with or want critiques, or specific topics you'd like to discuss. This should be a time for each of us to grow and take a few more steps on our painting journey. Never hesitate to call me. 208-524-2734
